CORPORAL H. J. WHEATON KILLED IN ACTION; FIRST SYRACUSE VICTIM ON BATTLE LINE!

YOUNG SOLDIER FALLS IN FIGHTING, PROBABLY AROUND TOUL SALIENT

No Details of Death Given in Dispatches from General Pershing Containing Casualty List.

NAME GOES ON HONOR ROLL OF HEROES BESIDE THAT OF CAPT. PHILIP LIGHTHALL

Members of Family Here Mingle Regret and Sorrow With Pride That He Died in Service of His Country.

Corporal Homer J. Wheaton, formerly of this city, was killed in action February 27, according to the casualty list issued yesterday by General Pershing.

The first Syracuse soldier has died fighting in France. His name will go on the roll of honor of the city's herolc dead beside that of Capt. Philip K. Lighthall, who went down with the torpedeed Tuscania off the coast of Ireland February 5.

There are no details given in the dispatches, but it is believed Wheaton fell somewhere north of Toul in the Lorraine sector, where there has been severe fighting between the Americans and Germans for several days.

Telegram for Aunt Arrives.

The address given as that of the "nearest-relative" to be notified in case of death or Marry was that of Wheaton's aunt, Mrs. Ada Ten Eyck, wife of E. H. Ten Eyck of No. 304 West Beard avenue. A telegram came for her last night, probably to appraise her of his death, but the Ten Eycks are at Palatka, Fla., where they have been all winter with other relatives of the dead soldier.

Issuance of the \$559,000 in bonds has been refused by the capital issues committee of the Second Federal Reserve District as part of a plan to conserve the national financial resources during the present war period. Mayor Stone and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment are fully aware of the conditions which threaten to deprive the children of the city of ordinary school facilities and efforts are being made to obtain legislation which will allow speedy completion of the work now under way.
